EDITORIAL

TOGETHER EVERYTHING IS POSSIBLE

Twenty years ago, Barbara left Switzerland for Thailand. She wanted to "give a year of her life" to a humanitarian cause. She is still there! Twenty years ago, Prapapone decided to direct her life toward helping people in need. Out of their meeting, the Sourire de Chiang Khong was born.

In the south, beaches with their palm trees. Bangkok, the City of Angels, exciting and extreme. In the north, densely wooded hills. Throughout the country, the inhabitants' legendary smiles and hospitality, exquisite cooking, countless golden temples, remnants of another civilization, Siam. All of this is Thailand! But every coin has another side.

"In Pattaya, where I spent my first year," Barbara tells us, "I met a lot of girls and women who were victims of prostitution, drugs, violence. Getting them out of their dramatic situation turned out to be almost impossible. I was haunted by their hidden suffering and helpless to change their pitiable state.

"Then, by chance, I met Prapapone and we decided to address the root of the problem: we went to the north of Thailand. The attraction to



this country of dreams became transformed into a call, into a duty to make our ideas happen. So we decided to become involved in the education of girls and boys from a region where, even today, they are threatened with being sold into prostitution, used for drug trafficking, forced to marry very young, mistreated, raped. We began by taking in twenty-five children. Since then, several hundred children have stayed in our centre. Today, we are immensely grateful to see the fruits of our labour: these young adults who are now professionally trained, responsible, hard-working and courageous, dealing with the hard realities of life.

"Foster parents from the beginning up to now, without wavering, you have helped us change unbearable destinies into promising futures. Donors from every walk of life, you have enabled us to develop the necessary facilities to carry out our activities. Friends, whose encouragement and often hidden gestures are so very precious to us, you are ever widening around you our network of support.

The Happy Brothers

Sai, Seng and Satit, three Hmong brothers, are highly motivated and hard-working, with their ups and downs. They have lived in our centre and been successful in their schooling.



Sai is working in the construction industry in Bangkok. He returns regularly to the

centre to proudly tell us about his life.



Seng is in the metal industry. After obtaining his diploma, he was hired by a

maritime company south of Bangkok. With his generous spirit, he brought together other former residents of our centre to build a small house for our staff meetings and meals.

In early January, after four months at sea, Seng came back to treat his young brothers and sisters at the Centre to a delicious meal ! He had also received some money from his colleagues at work, who were touched by his life story at the Le Sourire ! Seng stayed at the Centre for two days before leaving for his village further north. It's there that Sai and Seng have acquired, with their savings, a piece of land to build a house for their parents !



Satit, the youngest of the three brothers, is still living in our centre. He has chosen

to become an electrician and will complete his professional training in four years.

The three brothers are doing everything they can to build a house for their parents. Their deep gratitude toward their parents is, for Le Sourire, our most wonderful recompense.

And the others?

We're happy to tell you regularly in our newsletters about our young people who have realized their ambitions. However, it sometimes happens that we've been disappointed. Some children interrupt their stay at le Sourire, because their family moves or decides to put an end to their stay. Sometimes, too, especially at adolescence, a youngster lacks motivation or underestimates the value of schooling. Alas, parents don't always encourage their children to persevere!

Whenever this happens, we systematically keep in touch with those who leave us prematurely.

Many pick up their studies at a later date or obtain professional training elsewhere. Take Dai for instance, a young boy of Laotian origin : he came back to tell us that after due reflection, he was continuing his schooling at a Buddhist temple. Wipop was another boy who had to go through his adolescent crisis before training to become a teacher. То prove his determination, he regularly gives us a hand at the Centre and skilfully takes charge of our children. Many girls take charge of their lives by finding jobs in the sewing and health sectors. Some marry and become happy mothers who intend, they tell us, to give their children a good education.

In the long run, what we first perceive as a failure often turns out to be a nice surprise where each person discovers their path!

Champions of Smiles!



Our four youngsters are radiant with joy: they won their secondary school's team marathon race! This enabled them to represent their school at the marathon meeting of schools from northern Thailand, where they placed second! A result they can be proud of!

About Water and Ideas !

Barbara and Prapapone are constantly involved with environmental issues.

Not surprisingly, they devised an ingenious ecosystem for the girls'

vourselves:



The waste water comes out of the building which is on a hillside and flows

new toilets. See for

through three filtering layers: rock and stones, sand and then coal to eliminate the odours. Part of this water is collected and used to water the plants and flowers. Another part flows through a pipe toward the rice fields. Simple and effective !

Learning while Farming

Our farm didn't start yesterday. Over the years extracurricular activities have developed, thus enabling our youngsters to assimilate the natural process of things and to learn self-management.

This pedagogical agricultural project also brings us invaluable savings. In



the beginning we were obliged to buy all of our food. Today almost 75% of the rice eaten by the residents of

our centre comes from our own rice fields. Our own vegetable gardens provide us with a quarter of our vegetables, while the rest is bought from our trusted vegetable merchant. During the rainy season, we heartily enjoy our own mushrooms.

We also produce our own fruit: mangoes, papayas, pineapples, jackfruit, pink apples, longanes (litchi family), etc. Every year we



harvest more and more coconuts from our own trees. The coconut milk is highly appreciated in our kitchen.

Our fishponds are restocked every two years and give us a lot of fish. Our meat comes from our own cows and pigs fattened on our own corn. Our chickens are bought at the market.

For several years we have been able to sell our surplus of longanes and also a little corn. The profit from the sale of these agricultural products is reinvested in the upkeep of the plantations. Our youngsters take part actively in the negotiations, thus learning how to manage their money wisely.





Sensible management

The number of children increases yearly, as must the number of staff members.

Le Sourire de Chiang Khong hires local staff and trains them. In this way, we create jobs in a region where they are lacking, we work with the children in the spirit of their own mentality and increase our Foundation's integration, already well accepted, in the area.

Our current team is young and dynamic; they identify well with our action.



Le Sourire functions with a judiciously chosen form of management, according to the educational principle of self-management, where each child feels responsible for his tasks in "her"/"his" Centre, where the older children take care of the younger ones.

To take care of 180 children in the Centre and 200 in the villages, Barbara and Prapapone are assisted by a staff of ten people: school instructors, an administrative assistant, drivers, cooks, cleaners. Additionally, they hire temporary workers at planting and harvesting time.

A Staff Member tells his story



Pii Sor has been working at the centre for two years. Here are his impressions :

"I have accepted the challenge! Working with children is a struggle that begins again every day! A struggle that requires understanding, patience, a sense of observation, an attentive ear and gentle firmness. It's demanding work, often exhausting, but enriching and exciting.

Le Sourire de Chiang Khong radiates peace and joy. It's great coming here; you feel like staying. The enthusiasm is contagious, it catches hold of you and encourages you to take part in the development of this work where wonderful youngsters hope to find meaning to their lives. Barbara and Prapapone not only give us good training, they also accept us as members of the family of Le Sourire! Sharing our experiences with each other every day helps us grow closer and stronger.

There's a lot of work. From Monday to Friday, while the children are at school, the staff is busy organizing the Centre, at the farm and the many animals, cleaning the buildings, running errands outside the centre, etc. On Saturdays we accompany the children in their various activities, encouraging and teaching them. Sundays are free and are devoted to taking care of the children's hygiene, their homework, sports and games. It's also the day when their families come for a visit. A moment of relaxation when our youngsters can think calmly about the new week ahead of them.

Our motto is mutual respect, the sincere love that restores dignity and self-confidence to each child. Their happiness will be our happiness."

A Licence for Prapapone

The Thai Ministry of Social Affairs and Security assigned an independent, private organization, the Social Work Professions Council (SWPC), the task of setting the standards in the field of social work. A pedagogical preparation, seminars, conferences and talks lead to a final examination in view of obtaining the SWPC license which guarantees to the government that a NGO or any Thai social body is reliable and serious. The organization commits to protecting its members.

Prapapone obtained this licence in

February 2015, for a period of three years, which can be renewed. She is the 4th person in the region of Chiang Rai to have it; but



she is the first person in charge of a NGO. The other three work for the Government. She was sponsored by a teacher of nursing in Chiang Rai, a member of the SWPC, the very person who entrusted the boys Dominik in 2008 and Suphachai in 2014 to Le Sourire.

In the medium term, the conditions imposed by the SWPC will become obligatory for all social institutions such as schools, hospitals, religious communities, NGOs.

Ethical Charter



The "Sourire de Chiang Khong" is a children's home. Its mission is to bring educational supervision to children in the North of Thailand whose precarious situation generally destines them to drugs, prostitution and Aids. Its action is based on the following values:

Sustainable Action

The action of Le Sourire aims at the long-term, preparing the children to become responsible, free and sociable adults.

Schooling

Schooling is provided by state schools. Le Sourire follows each child from primary school through to the completion of an apprenticeship or higher studies, taking into account the capabilities and future aspirations of each child.

Education

Le Sourire offers children affective and educational supervision conducive to their personal and professional development. Drug, prostitution and Aids prevention are inherent in this education.

Respect

Le Sourire is independent. It respects the sociocultural and denominational origins of each child. It cultivates the children's appreciation for their roots and traditions, for sports and leisure activities, as well as for agriculture and gardening. Planting, harvesting and animal breeding are extracurricular activities, carried out in full respect of the rights of the child.

Autonomy and Responsibility

Life in the home takes place according to community rules understood by each child. These encourage the natural development of initiativetaking, responsibility and solidarity. The home functions on the principle of self-management: the older children help the younger ones. The children of Le Sourire consider and treat the home as their possession.

Outreach

Le Sourire also follows the schooling of children who live in nearby villages and participates in the community life of the whole region, thereby enhancing the children's wellbeing and raising their awareness as future citizens.

Official Recognition in Thailand

In Thailand, Le Sourire de Chiang Khong has the status of a foundation and is recognized by government authorities, while at the same time preserving its independence. It keeps up to date the training of its staff according to their needs and in respect of official requirements. The home rigorously manages its possessions and the funds received.

Swiss Association

The Thai Foundation is supported by an association domiciled in Switzerland under Swiss law, which functions on a voluntary basis and transfers almost the entire sum of gifts and sponsorships to Le Sourire's work with children.


Abused, brutalized, raped, Manipulated, used, forced, killed, Hungry, thirsty, ill.
